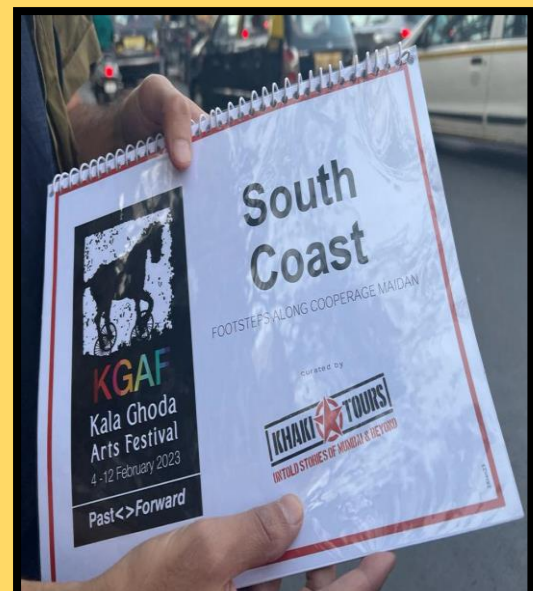
The streets of Mumbai are filled with memory and history. We can never complete the knowledge of it. So, the students were divided into groups to explore the city.

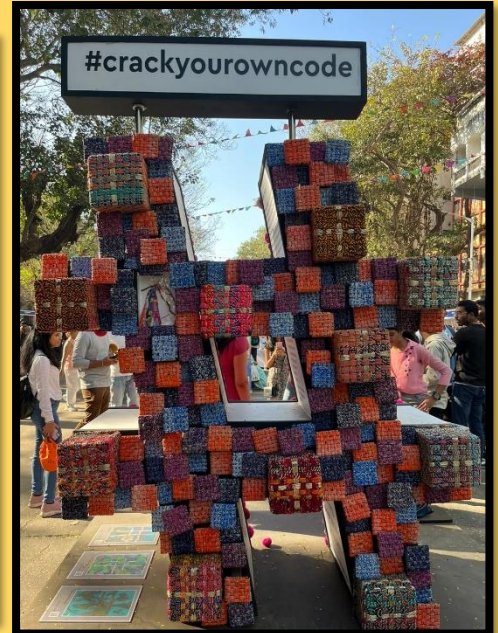
